Solaris Cancer Care provides a helping hand to thousands of cancer patients, their families and carers in Western Australia.

Solaris Cancer Care was founded in 2001, after Dr David Joske, Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital's Senior Clinical Consultant in Haematology and a UWA Department of Medicine's Clinical Professor, identified a need for better information and supportive care for cancer patients.

Solaris Cancer Care is an independent, not-for-profit organisation, providing access to primarily free resources and services, to assist with the emotional and physical effects of cancer diagnosis, treatment, recovery and palliative care.

Three out of our five centres are attached to both metropolitan and regional hospitals, including Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital, St John of God Hospital in Subiaco and Albany Health Campus, allowing Solaris Cancer Care to work closely with patients' specialists, doctors and nursing staff.

All services are founded on a robust medical base and are consistently refined through our commitment to sound research and education.

At Solaris Cancer Care, we are dedicated to empowering the community through the provision of quality, reliable information on cancer-related programs and support services.

In 2017, Solaris Cancer Care merged with Cancer Support WA, resulting in more than 34 years of combined experience to create an even stronger supportive environment for cancer patients and their carers.

Solaris Cancer Care was the first of its kind in Australia and is the only Western Australian based organisation providing these vital services.

## **Our Founder**



#### Dr David Joske

In 2001, Dr David Joske founded Solaris Cancer Care after identifying a need for better information and supportive care for cancer patients. As the foundation's Chairperson, Dr Joske is a Senior Clinical Consultant in Haematology at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital and holds two National Heath and Medical Research Council Grants in this area. He has also founded an award-winning Cancer Shared Care Project and the Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital Brownes Dairy Cancer Support Centre in 2001. He is a Clinical Senior Lecturer with the UWA Department of Medicine and the Haematology sub-editor for the Internal Medicine Journal of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians. In 2005, he was awarded the John Curtin Medal and has been a finalist four times for Western Australian of the Year.

In 2016, Dr Joske was the Western Region Social Entrepreneur for the Ernst and Young Entrepreneur of the Year Award. The nomination recognised Dr Joske's pioneering role in bringing complementary therapies into the mainstream medical environment in a safe and caring manner. Through Solaris Cancer Care, Dr Joske has enhanced the understanding of integrated care and the importance of physiological and psychological wellbeing.

#### **Clare Lubich**

Clare is a vibrant single mother of two, always looking to put others first. When diagnosed with cancer, she felt like she was battling cancer alone, and reached out for a helping hand.

"When I was going through cancer I felt fearful and alone, I was facing radiation treatment after already undergoing two surgeries. I was worries about how this would affect my teenage daughters; I wanted to be strong as I have always been there for them. With no other family in Perth, I wondered who would be there for me.

Solaris Cancer Care became my sanctuary, a welcome island in a very turbulent and grey sea. The centre gave me the strength I needed.

What I loved most is, it is about taking control over parts of your health journey and feeling empowered and nurtured along the way.
